ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Seven academic colleges** plus Interdisciplinary Studies offer degrees at the bachelors and masters level. CSULB currently offers 76 baccalaureate degrees (200 programs), 62 masters degrees (89 programs), and one joint doctoral degree with the Claremont Colleges in Engineering & Industrial Applied Mathematics. In addition, CSULB offers 60 minors, 55 concurrent or postbaccalaureate certificates and 37 programs leading to education credentials.

DEGREES GRANTED

Since 1950, CSULB has awarded a total of 159,610 baccalaureate degrees, including 4,158 in 1999-2000. And since 1951, CSULB has awarded a total of 32,590 master's degrees, including 1,099 in 1999-2000.

LIBRARY

Academic programs at CSULB are supported by University Library and Learning Resources. As of October, 2000, the Library possessed:

1,129,558 volumes
1,599,324 microforms
36,304 non-book materials
3,513 unduplicated periodical subscriptions

COAST, (the Library's online catalog) averages more than 6,000 searches a day, which retrieve over a million records. In 1999-2000, 244,554 items circulated, and over 399,568 items were used and reshelved within the Library

CAMPUS

The CSULB campus encompasses a total of 324 acres with 84 permanent buildings (4,266,853 square feet).

There are more than 149 acres of landscaping, with 75 acres of grass, over 80 species of ornamental plants, and more than 40 varieties of trees, at least 15,000 in all, highlighted by over 3000 Helen Borcher (*prunus persica*) flowering peach trees — the pride of the campus.

Finally, there are over 100 acres of parking and parking facilities, with more than 10,000 parking spaces.

Housing: 1827 students live on campus during Fall 2000 (full capacity), in 18 residence halls, including International House, where 88 international students and U.S. students room together.
