Housing: 1,962 students live on campus in 18 residence halls, including International House, where 86 international students and U.S. students room together.

Sports: Men's and women's basketball, cross-country, golf, track and field, volleyball, and water polo, plus men's baseball, and women's soccer, softball, and tennis comprise Division I intercollegiate sports at CSULB. In addition, intramural sports are archery, crew, cycling, ice hockey, martial arts, rugby, sailing, skiing, soccer, and water skiing. Many club sports are available to all students, including, but not limited to, Aikido and other martial arts, triathlon, bowling, and crew.

## ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Seven academic colleges\*\* plus Interdisciplinary Studies offer degrees at the bachelors and masters level. CSULB currently offers 80 baccalaureate degrees (208 programs), 66 masters degrees (95 programs), and one joint doctoral degree with the Claremont Colleges in Engineering & Industrial Applied Mathematics. In addition, CSULB offers 68 minors, 55 concurrent or postbaccalaureate certificates and 36 programs leading to education credentials.

## DEGREES GRANTED

Since 1950, CSULB has awarded a total of 168,821 baccalaureate degrees, including 4,859 in 2001-2002. And since 1951, CSULB has awarded a total of 34,937 master's degrees, including 1,137 in 2001-2002.

## LIBRARY

Academic programs at CSULB are supported by University Library and Learning Resources. As of March, 2003, the Library possessed:

1,475,495 volumes
1,483,857 microforms
27,346 non-book materials
3,965 unduplicated periodical subscriptions

COAST, (the Library's online catalog) averages more than 7,000 searches a day, which retrieve almost 1,400,000 records. In the first 8 months of FY 2002-2003, 262,621 items circulated, and over 83,000 items were used in-house.

## CAMPUS

The CSULB campus encompasses a total of 323 acres with 84 permanent buildings (4,266,853 square feet).

There are more than 149 acres of landscaping, with 75 acres of grass, over 80 species of ornamental plants, and more than 40 varieties of trees, 6,226 in all, highlighted by 624 Helen Borchert (*prunus persica*) flowering peach trees — the pride of the campus.

Finally, there are over 100 acres of parking and parking facilities, with more than 10,000 parking spaces.
