Housing

1,962 students live on campus in 18 residence halls, including International House, where 88 international students and U.S. students room together.

Sports

Men's and women's basketball, cross-country, golf, track and field, volleyball, and water polo, plus men's baseball, and women's soccer, softball, and tennis comprise Division I intercollegiate sports at CSULB. In addition, intramural sports are archery, crew, cycling, ice hockey, martial arts, rugby, sailing, skiing, soccer, and water skiing. Many club sports are available to all students, including, but not limited to, Aikido and other martial arts, triathlon, bowling, and crew.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Seven academic colleges** plus Interdisciplinary Studies offer degrees at the bachelors and masters level. CSULB currently offers 85 baccalaureate degrees (207 programs), 67 masters degrees (99 programs), one joint doctoral degree with the Claremont Colleges in Engineering & Industrial Applied Mathematics, and one joint Ed.D. with University of California, Irvine in Educational Administration and Leadership. In addition, CSULB offers 72 minors, 52 concurrent and postbaccalaureate certificate programs, and 37 programs leading to educational credentials.

DEGREES GRANTED

Since 1950, CSULB has awarded a total of 184,860 baccalaureate degrees, including 5,790 awarded in 2004-2005. Since 1951 CSULB has awarded a total of 38,390 master's degrees, including 1,433 in 2004-2005.

CAMPUS

The CSULB campus encompasses a total of 323 acres with 84 permanent buildings (4,266,853 square feet).

There are more than 149 acres of landscaping, with 75 acres of grass, over 80 species of ornamental plants, and more than 40 varieties of trees, at least 10,000 in all, highlighted by over 2000 Helen Borcher (*prunus persica*) flowering peach trees-the pride of the campus.

Finally, there are over 100 acres of parking and parking facilities, with more than 10,000 parking spaces.
